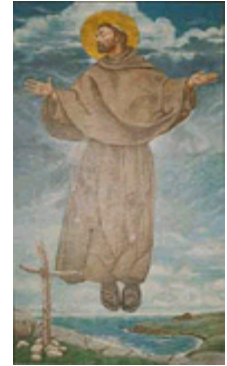
During Lent our prayer life is deepened by the passion, death and resurrection of our Savior, Jesus Christ. The following is from the “Franciscan Morning and Evening Praise: “We know that neither Clare nor Francis offered a complicated prayer method. They call their followers to prayer with a decidedly contemplative dimension – to be present to God who is present to all creatures is prayer. They require that our prayer be Trinitarian. Our prayer is always addressed to God in the Son by the power of the Spirit ... Our prayer is to be Incarnational. We become alive to God’s deeds in the greatest gift of God, the Incarnation, in which God becomes one with us in the Son. The purpose of all Franciscan prayer, then, is to give God ceaseless praise and thanksgiving for all God has done - does in creation and in our re-creation in Christ.”

“Prayer is a way of life for us – all the time and everywhere. We should be so filled with God that adoration flows from the depth of our inner life ... with joy and thanksgiving. This is the holiness to which we are called. Our every day should thus be sanctified. In Francis’ time, this sanctification of the day was given clear expression in the divine office. This is still the Church’s understanding of the Liturgy of the Hours. We pray with the Son in his Mystical Body celebrating God’s gift of salvation throughout the day. For Francis, praying the Office is also a sign of fidelity to the Church’s tradition of daily praise and intercession.”

“The created world is the expression of God’s goodness and the theater of God’s redemptive love for us. Because we are made in God’s image, it is possible for us to seek union with God as we do God’s will. Thus the Franciscan does not flee the world in order to escape to God, but seeks immersion in its sacramental reality.”

Thomas Becket: Warrior, Priest, Rebel

Last time, we took a whirlwind tour of the first thousand years after Christ. Today, we turn the clock ahead by just 120 years to the part of London called Cheapside where the family of Gilbert and Matilda Becket and their son Thomas lived. The Becketts had migrated from Normandy to London to take advantage of the new opportunities offered merchants. John Guy's *Thomas Becket: Warrior, Priest, Rebel* (Random House) offers a very detailed account of Thomas's rise to chancellor and then Archbishop under King Henry II. Becket began his work under the guidance of Theobald, the Archbishop of Canterbury.

A fascinating account of the relationship between Thomas and Henry is presented along with intriguing glimpses into the lifestyles of Kings, priests, archbishops, cardinals, and the pope (which pope depended on which side of the split you were on). Henry essentially appointed Thomas as Archbishop expecting him to be loyal as both chancellor and Archbishop. Interestingly, before Becket could take on the role as Archbishop, he had to be ordained as a priest. Becket, apparently seeing the possible conflict of interests, surprised Henry by resigning as chancellor. Although many accounts portray Henry and Thomas as good friends, the book presents a less than equal relationship with Henry on many occasions reminding Thomas of his lower class beginnings.

The battle over the rights of Church and state is a long and complicated struggle, with Thomas slowly coming to realize all that was involved. One of Thomas's concerns was that Henry wanted to separate the Church of England from the Catholic Church. Many attempts at reconciliation between Henry and Thomas are shown, but Henry usually proves to be a man who does not keep his word. At the end, in a fit of anger, Henry remarks how he wished that Thomas could be dealt with finally. Overhearing this, four of Henry's knights, thinking they would get a good promotion, take it upon themselves to murder Thomas. Often the book refers to this as an assassination, but the author makes it clear that Henry did not intentionally order this attack to occur. Henry was shocked, but probably relieved to have Thomas gone. The confrontation between this Henry and Thomas sets the stage for another confrontation a few hundred years later between another Henry and Thomas. This is a truly interesting, well-researched, and even-handed book on this gruesome incident in history. - Harry Ford, OFS

THE OFFICIAL NAME OF THE ORDER

From the International - General Chapter 2011

THE USE AND THE TRANSLATION OF THE NAME OF THE ORDER

1. The official name of the Order is Ordo Franciscanus Sæcularis.
2. Translations of the name of the Order
 - 2.1. The translation of the name of the Order is already made in the four official languages, and these are the ones to be used in these languages, namely in Italian, in English, in Spanish and in French.

2.2. The name can be translated into local languages only when the literal translation from Latin is easily understandable even by the civil society and does not change its meaning or substance.

2.3. When the translation into the national language distorts the meaning of the name, or is linguistically impossible to transfer the genuine meaning, Ordo Franciscanus Sæcularis must always be used, which can be followed by expressions to clarify and make more understandable the nature of the Secular Franciscan Order to everyone in the local language.

3. The acronym

The acronym which refers to the name Ordo Franciscanus Sæcularis is OFS and is always to be used regardless of the language. For example, when Secular Franciscans use the acronym after their name, they must use "OFS".

LENT: PRAYER, PENANCE AND CHARITY TO RENEW OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD
– from Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI - Lent February 26, 2012

"The Lord chose to undergo the attack of the tempter so as to defend us with His help and instruct us with His example", said the Holy Father quoting a text written by St. Leo the Great. This episode teaches us that man is never free from temptation, but we can become stronger than any enemy "by following the Lord every day with patience and humility, learning to build our lives not without Him or as if He did not exist, but in Him and with Him, because He is the source of true life. The temptation to remove God, to regulate ourselves and the world counting only on our own abilities, has always been present in the history of man", the Pope said.

In Christ, God addresses man "in an unexpected way, with a closeness that is unique, tangible and full of love. God became incarnate and entered man's world in order to take sin upon Himself, to overcome evil and to bring man back into God's world. But His announcement was accompanied by a request to respond to such a great gift. Indeed, Jesus said "repent, and believe in the good news'. This is an invitation to have faith in God and to convert every day of our lives to His will, orienting our every action and our every thought towards what is good. The period of Lent is a good time to renew and strengthen our relationship with God through daily prayer, acts of penance and works of fraternal charity".
